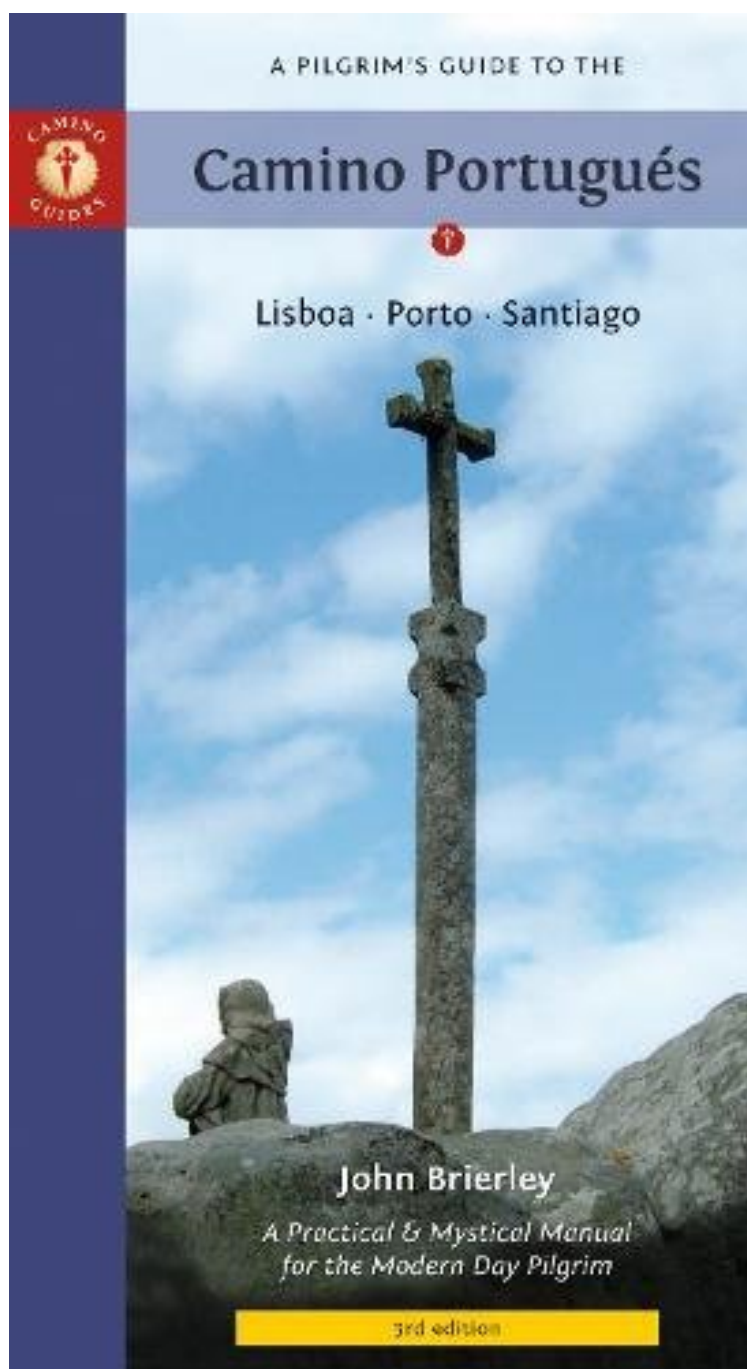

I bought the 2004 edition which is outdated on some restaurants and hotels, but I just bought the 2009 edition and everything has been updated. I recommend the book to everyone who goes to the Camino (this is my third time, first in Portugal) because it has all the "to do" things you really have to do. My only reservation is that the book is written to pilgrims that make the camino with a budget. There are some good hotels and restaurants on the cities noted by the book, but I would include some more for the pilgrims that are rich.

Updated to include newer maps and photos and weighing less to support carefree traveling, the latest edition in these comprehensive guidebooks to the Camino de Santiago and its offshoots contains all the information needed by modern-day pilgrims wishing to walk the sacred Way of Saint James. Overview route planners plus all 23 daily stage maps and detailed town plans help sojourners with as much advance preparation as they need. The completely redone maps feature contour guides to help distinguish the terrain that will be crossed each day, while full information on all pilgrim hostels, as well as details for alternative accommodation, allow travelers to plot adequate nightly stopping points. All reference information is accompanied by helpful spiritual guidelines to support the seeker's inner journey as well as the outer pilgrimage. For travelers who wish to walk the coast of Portugal, this volume has been expanded from its previous edition to cover the entire pilgrimage from Lisbon to Porto to Santiago.
