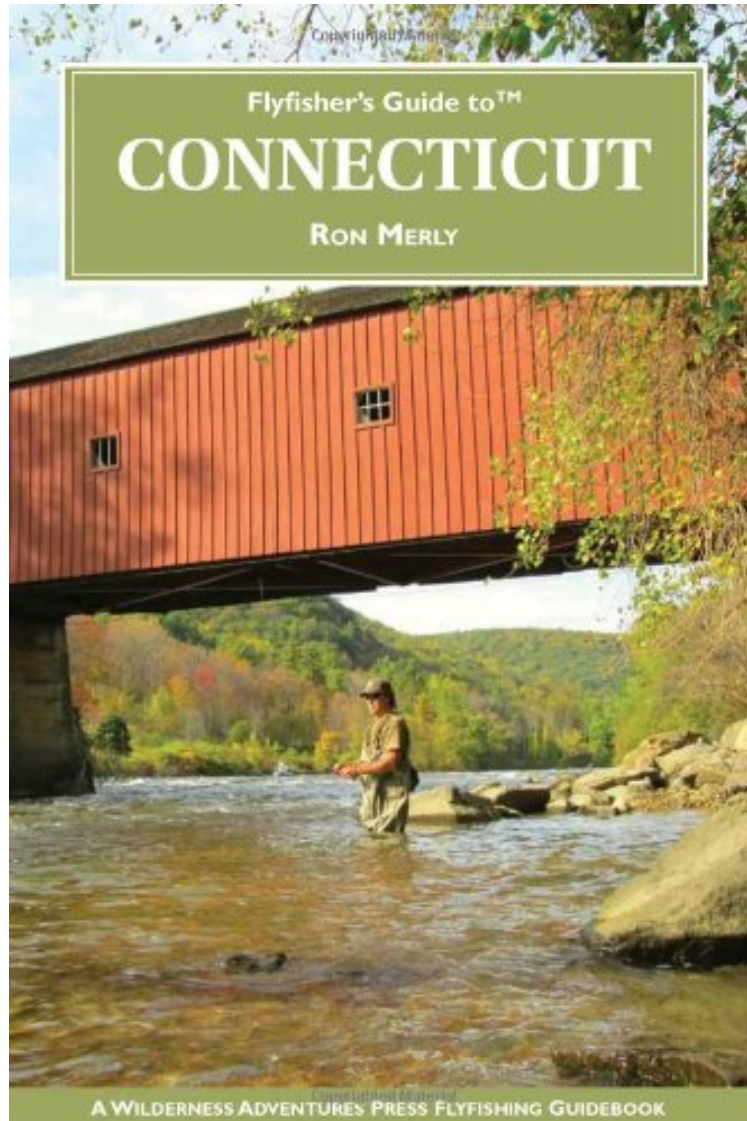

I would recommend Mr. Merly's book to anyone who wants to try a new river, lake, or stream in CT. The coverage is expansive and clearly separated by county. All of the major rivers and most of the larger streams are covered. In a state as small as CT, where you can go from one corner of the state to the

other in under 3 hours, it is so easy to try out new fishing areas and this book makes it far less painful than hunting for access; I can have the digital edition open on my phone for last minute access or location changes. Some may argue that the book makes some already pressured areas \*too\* accessible, but I would disagree. Irresponsible anglers filling five gallon buckets with undersized fish are generally not the ones likely to buy this book. Furthermore, there are miles of vacant river in this state. I can think of three productive spots within a 30 minutes drive where I am not likely to encounter another angler on opening day, let alone any other time of year. Find a blue line you love.
