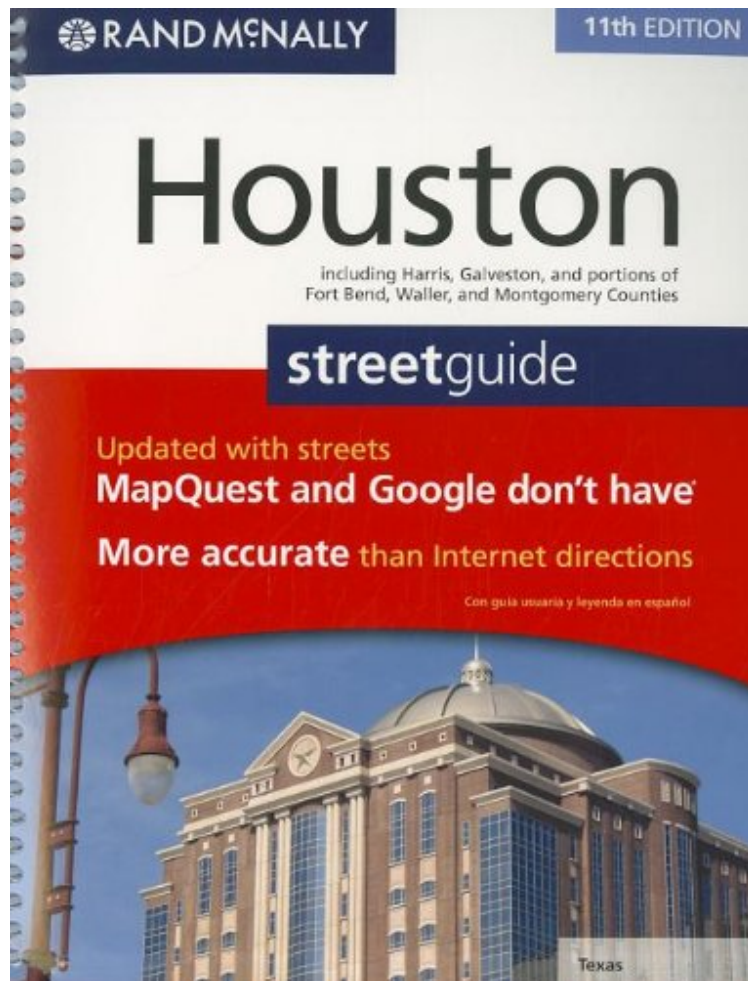

Good, but often hard to useBy savyon941As with most street atlas books, this one is complete enough, but you have to do so much jumping around from page to page, and often areas right nearby are several pages away, that it's helpfulness can be compromised. Listen, Houston sprawls, and there's lots and lots of areas, often miles and miles from each other...so this type of book is often the only thing that will work.

What it seems to short on is subdivision and landmark names. Like most cities, one's neighborhood is his subdivision. Homes are advertised with the name of a subdivision, rather a street address perhaps. Sometimes subdivisions may be small enclaves, and unless you see where they are on a map cannot judge a property. Subdivision names would also help in just getting around, as there are often signs at the entry to a subdivision that help you to realize you're headed the right way toward your eventual destination. In a city in which you may only be somewhat familiar, and I have an excellent sense of direction, you stop off for a soda or something, and might pull out in the wrong direction. So including as many landmarks and markers as possible helps me. Buildings often lack numbers, and street signs don't always have the number of the block. Making a U-turn isn't always easy.
